## **Butterfly Corner**

Named for their pattern of oranges, yellows, and browns, the Painted Lady (Vanessa virginiensis) is commonly found year round, throughout Florida. This species is commonly spotted in yards and parks, and there's a good chance you've seen quite a few of them in your gardens.

Painted ladies are members of the brush-foot family (Nymphalinae) of butterflies, just like monarchs and queens. The cobweb pattern and large blue eyespots on the undersides of their

wings are unique identifiers. The wingspan of adults ranges from 1.75 to 2".

Their preferred host plants are members of the cudweed, or everlasting species. Thistles and mallows are, also, home to their caterpillars, and adult butterflies continue to be drawn to cudweeds and thistles, as well as milkweeds, button-bush, and ironweed.

Pale yellowish-green eggs are laid individually on the upper side of the leaves of host plants. Larvae (caterpillars) make nests at the tops of host plants by silking together leaves and chaff at the tips of the flower stalks where they hide during the daytime and come out at night and on overcast days to feed. These nests are, of course, not attractive for us to look at, but be assured, that the butterflies that result from the neat, fluffy nests are well worth it.

The caterpillar is black with bands of yellow and black lines. In between the bands are orange or red spots at the base of black branching spines.

The chrysalis is brown with gold spots. The chrysalis is generally formed in the silk nest.

Adults prefer floral nectar, especially of thistles, milkweed, buttonbush and ironweed. but they also feed on sap, fermenting fruit, and mud. Frequently, they can be found basking on the ground.

Although everything I've read says that the Painted Lady is quite common here in Florida, I can't say that I'm familiar with it. Perhaps I need to find some cudweed for my garden. I will let you know if I have any success.

When she heard Nancy Lemcke's request for members to bring their plant problems to November's meeting for a Plant Doctor session, Carol felt that we might all profit from the suggestions made in the article below, which was first published in the Treasure Coast Newspapers. Reading this article will help us bring good questions to the Plant Doctor on November 16.



What is this plant is more easily answered when plenty of information is provided. The lovely specimen pictured was in a road median in South Florida. The speeding truck past gives a size reference; there are images of leaves and a trunk. The answer is Clusia rosea, AKA Autograph Tree, Balsam Apple, or Pitch Apple. It is the same plant that is often planted as a hedge.

# What is....? by Carol Cloud Bailey

Many of us who work to help others with the green things and spaces around us often dread the email, text, or call that starts with "What is..." add your own end to the question. Usually, the query is about plant ID, critter found in the yard, or the death or decline of a plant. Most of us really do want to help, but often information from the questioner is lacking for us to provide a reasonably accurate answer.

So, in my own interest and the myriad of nurserymen and women, landscape professionals, teachers, Master Gardeners, and Extension Agents, here is a bit of advice on sending questions about plants and plant problems.

Remember when the teacher in the classroom gave us all the basics of investigating or researching a question or problem? Yes, it's the tried and true list of things to answer, who, what, when, where, and why. When sending a question or picture, provide the answers to as many of these as possible.

#### What is ...? Cont'd

 WHO refers to the name of the plant, if this is not known, provide a description, tree, shrub, groundcover, or flower. Include size and narrative.

- WHAT refers to the issues. Is identification needed? Is there a problem? Be specific, is the plant dead
  or showing symptoms of some type of disorder. Again, describe any issues thoroughly. Is there a
  pattern? How many plants are involved? Also, describe any changes in the care or surrounding area.
  Condition changes such as drought, fertilizer or other care product applications, or construction
  nearby are just a few possibilities to consider.
- WHEN and WHERE are complex parameters to define. If plant ID is the question, the age of the plant
  or lawn is sometimes helpful. Be sure to include the location of the plant or issue in question; South
  Florida or Texas? Conditions count, too; is it dry or wet, sunny or in the shade? WHEN is very
  important if the question involves decline, disorder, or disease. WHEN did the symptoms first appear?
  WHERE on the plant? HOW LONG has the problem existed?

The cliché is true; a picture is worth all the words used to describe it. However, pictures must tell the story. Take a picture of the overall plant or area. Take a close-up of the leaves and issue, be sure to include front and back or top and bottom. Take images of the trunk or stems, particularly at ground level. For the ID question, images of flowers, fruit, stems, leaves, and overall are best. Be aware of the lighting; from behind, illuminating the subject is an excellent place to start.

Just like going to the doctor, the more information accurately provided to the green professional, the better the chance of a correct ID or diagnosis of the problem. Tell the truth, if weed & feed was applied to the roots of Granny's favorite flowering tree, say so. Only then can a possible solution, the why and/or what, be provided.
